## St Vincent de Paul Christmas Appeal

The theme of this year's Christmas Appeal is the ongoing impacts of the cost-of-living crisis which has seen already vulnerable people pushed into poverty with barely anything left to hold onto and facing the brink of homelessness.



Workers in full-time employment, families on dual incomes

and renters burdened by the soaring cost of housing have turned to the Society through necessity. Alarmingly, the number of people turning to our members for the first time has increased from one-in-four to one-in-three over the past year.

While cost-of-living pressures occur across the board, the most acute impacts are felt by those with the least capacity to absorb the financial, social and wellbeing blows.



#### Reflection

In the wilderness God's salvation comes to a broken people. In the midst of what is seemingly an impossible situation, hope emerges with vigour. In this context, hope is an openness to surprise, the surprise that God is in no way limited to the imaginings of human minds and the consequences of human

history. This is the kind of hope that is proclaimed in the wilderness by John; it is the kind of hope that trusts that from the impossible, God can work a new creation.

There is something of a time warp in Christianity. What is future is made present. The prophetic oracle announces the future as if it is already happening. This sense of the future-present prompts new ways of living. As the future takes root in human lives, the present is transformed into a new creation and the Day of the Lord appears.

God's future comes through the wilderness into the broken city and inspires a broken-hearted people. The contrite heart is a broken heart, an emptied-out heart, a hope-filled heart. It is a heart that is unencumbered by the past and that lives currently in the passing of time and the fragility of being alive. The contrite, broken heart can be filled only by what is promised in the future. This is the paradox of Advent. In the middle of the wilderness, God works the impossible in those whose hearts are ready for the surprise of hope.

## The fate of humanity will be decided now, Pope tells COP28 summit

The future of humanity depends on what people choose now, Pope Francis said in his message to global leaders at the COP28 World Climate Action Summit in Dubai.

'Are we working for a culture of *life* or a culture of *death*?' he asked in his message. 'To all of you I make this heartfelt appeal: Let us choose life! Let us choose the future!'

'The purpose of power is to *serve*. It is useless to cling to an authority that will one day be remembered for its inability to take

action when it was urgent and necessary to do so. History will be grateful to you,' the Pope wrote.

The destruction of the environment is 'a sin' that not only 'greatly endangers all human beings, especially the most vulnerable', the Pope wrote, but it also 'threatens to unleash a conflict between generations.'

'The drive to produce and possess has become an obsession, resulting in an inordinate greed that has made the environment the object of unbridled exploitation,' the Pope wrote. People must recognise their limits, with humility and courage, and seek authentic fulfilment.

'What stands in the way of this? The divisions that presently exist among us,' he wrote. *Edited extract Cathnews* 

#### The Advent Wreath

The lighting of a different candle on each Sunday in Advent invites us to pause and reflect. Each candle has its own symbolism, while the intertwined evergreen leaves of the Advent wreath remind us of the promise of eternal life that Christ brings.

In most Christian traditions the first candle, lit on Advent Sunday itself, represents hope – a sign of our hopeful expectation as we await the coming of the Messiah.

The next three candles mark the themes of *peace*, *joy and love*. The large white candle is the 'Christ candle', lit as we mark the birth of Jesus on Christmas Day.

**The gospel of Mark** is sometimes portrayed as a 'no fuss' gospel. Nowhere is this more

clearly seen than in this week's passage. We have the first eight verses of the gospel and the author wastes no time in announcing the purpose, 'The beginning of the Good News about Jesus Christ, the Son of God.'

The gospel of Mark does not give any infancy narrative or genealogy like Matthew or Luke, nor a theological foreword like John. It jumps straight in with a declaration that Jesus is the Son of God and almost immediately begins to explore his ministry.
