In this fifth week of Lent, we once again use the readings of year A in conjunction of third scrutiny for our RCIA candidates.



The readings reflect death

and rising from the dead take many forms.

In Ezekiel, death is akin to hopelessness, and resurrection is its reversal - the infusion of hope into an exiled, suffering community.

For St Paul, resurrection is linked with righteousness and new life with Christ through the death of sin.

And in the Gospel, the raising of Lazarous is a literal, physical return to life from death, and with it a shift from mourning to celebration.

Consider the areas of death in your own life and in the world around you - those spaces of hopelessness, brokenness, and mourning.

What spaces need new life, and what would resurrection look like in those spaces.

Reflection

On this last Sunday in Lent Lazarus is given to us to help us think about the tombs in which we lie hidden and the life to which we are called. The bad spirit seduces most of us into having some form of secretive life. It might be a secret we can't tell, a sin we can't confess or a memory we want to bury. At its worst it can be a lifestyle or a pattern of unethical behaviour we have divorced from the rest of our lives. We may even con ourselves into believing that all of this is normal and 'not so bad'.

These tombs often look similar. They seem small on the surface, but as we get away with our secrets we bury ourselves in them more deeply. We jealously guard the entrance, displacing energy to defend our tombs and we're ashamed if anyone rolls away the stone and sees the mess inside.

But this Sunday Jesus stands at the entrance of our tombs and calls us out of them. We're asked to face down the bad spirits that keep us locked in secrecy, to move away from shame, embrace repentance, recognise the price to be paid for being true to what's best in ourselves and we're invited to know the light and life of Christ's healing and forgiveness.

No one can pretend that this journey is easy, but it's what Lent is all about: the journey from the tomb of our own particular deaths, through penance to the new life of Easter. May this Eucharist allow us to see the Lord stand at our tomb and gently call us by name, 'Come forth'.

And at His word may we be unbound and let go free.

The Scrutinies



In recent weeks, we have heard Fr Sang refer to the Scrutinies celebrated by our catechumens and candidates. These are part of a series of rites belonging to the RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation) of Adults) that are celebrated during the season of Lent on the third, fourth and fifth Sundays

What are the Scrutinies, and what is their significance?

'Some people feel quite uncomfortable with the term 'scrutiny'. The word 'scrutinize' means to examine in minute detail, and we may feel that it is intrusive or hypocritical to pry into the lives and motives of those who wish to join the church. Because of those misgivings, the term 'rites of healing and strengthening' is sometimes used instead. The ritual book says that the purpose of the scrutinies is to 'heal all that is weak, defective, or sinful in the hearts of the elect' and 'to give them strength in Christ, who is the way, the truth, and the life'. The rite also describes the scrutinies as 'rites for self-searching and repentance'. (RCIA 128). Every time we celebrate the sacrament of baptism, we ask the questions, 'Do you renounce Satan... and all his works...and all his empty promises?' These are serious questions. We should consider them carefully before answering. And that is what the elect, those preparing to be baptised at the Easter Vigil, spend much of Lent doing.

For those who are making their final preparation for baptism, Lent is a time of purification and enlightenment. In the light of God's word, they examine their lives and ask the entire Christian community to pray that whatever is weak and sinful within them may be eliminated and that whatever is good and holy may be affirmed.'

When the Scrutinies are celebrated within the Mass, they occur after the homily when 'a litany of intercession, the power of Jesus over all sin is proclaimed. A prayer is then said over the elect asking for their deliverance and strengthening. The presider, catechists, sponsors and other members of the community may also lay their hands on the heads of the elect in an ancient sign of forgiveness, healing and empowerment. Because the entire community will renew its baptismal promises at Easter, we all take this opportunity to examine our way of life and ask ourselves whether we are truly living as Christ's disciples, as people of the Gospel.'

It is recommended that Parishes use 'the Gospels of Year A in Years B and C when there are catechumens because these scriptures are of major importance in regard to Christian initiation (LMI 97). They are the stories of the Samaritan woman who meets Jesus at the well, the man born blind who is healed and who comes to faith, and the raising of Lazarus from the dead. By examining ourselves through these readings, we come to know that we have become dry and barren, that we have been blinded, and that we have become deadened through sin.

When we and the elect are asked at Easter to renounce Satan, evil works and empty promises, our answer can be a thoughtful, strong and heartfelt "I do".'

World Water Day 22 March.

We associate water with a bountiful and well-provided life. It is a gift. Water is also a gift that we often take for granted. Years of drought and of drying rivers, however, have shown that we need to care for it. It can turn from abundance to scarcity. We know that if water fails, our food, our security from fire and flood and our liveable environment will also come under threat.



In developing nations the burden of climate change and associated drought will fall most heavily on the poor. It will affect the crops and herds they live on, the quality of the water they drink and the washing on which hygiene and health depend. Lack of water can easily develop into famine. The shortage of water will also lead to competition for it between nations and corporations. Instead of being a gift that is free for all in society, it will become a prized commodity to be bought and sold on the market, with the inevitable further impoverishment of the poor.

When we think of water we see the importance of all the delicate relationships that make up our world, and the need to pay attention to them in the way in which we work and live. That has been the emphasis of Pope Francis when he speaks of attending both to the cry of the poor and the cry of the earth.

We are led to see that water is not an unfailing resource to be used for private gain. It is a gift to our society and to our world. And as a gift it lays on us a mission. We are required to pay attention to all the factors that affect rainfall and drought, and order our society in a way that makes demands on everyone, but also benefits everyone, especially the most poor.
