Holy Land Collection—Good Friday 29th March

This collection promotes the missionary work of the Church in the Holy Land by providing welfare assistance to local Christians in areas such as health, education, employment, housing, parishes, and orphanages. It is also used to maintain over 70 churches and shrines associated with the life of Jesus.

THE EASTER

Due to the ongoing war, the Church and people of the Holy Land are still struggling with reduced income due to fewer pilgrims and lower church attendance around the world.

In 2023 Australian Catholics were once again extremely generous and we were able to send to the Holy Land nearly \$1.4 million. The reality for the Holy Land mission is that they will continue to face challenges financial and spiritual and so we again ask Catholics around the world again to be as generous as possible, with their financial support as well as the spiritual support.

Please remember the Christians of the Holy Land on Good Friday.

Easter (Sacred) Triduum: The Great Days

For priests, for liturgy planners and ministers, in fact for all Catholics, this coming week is the busiest of the church year. On four consecutive days the church will be filled for important services of worship starting with the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Thursday and ending on Easter Sunday.

It may seem strange then that this period of four days is referred to as the paschal or Easter Triduum, meaning three days. Here the church follows the Jewish method of counting a day from sunset to sunset: so Holy Thursday evening to Good Friday evening is the first day, Good Friday evening to Holy Saturday evening the second, and Holy Saturday evening to Easter Sunday evening the third day. What may seem like four days is actually three.

With people leading such busy lives and looking forward to Easter holidays, many may be tempted to choose to attend just one of the big liturgies of the Triduum – perhaps Good Friday because of the moving veneration of the cross or the Easter Vigil because it's the main celebration of the period...

But to miss any of the three liturgies of the Easter Triduum is like missing one act of a three-act play. The Triduum is best understood as *one three-day-long liturgy*, or as one liturgy with three different moments. This is illustrated clearly when we consider how the liturgies of this period begin and end.

The Mass on Holy Thursday evening begins in the usual way but there is no blessing or dismissal at the end. Instead there is a procession of the Blessed Sacrament to the place of reservation. People depart in silence. The Good Friday liturgy begins with a silent procession, a period of silent prayer, and the opening prayer. It finishes with the prayer over the people. Again there is no final blessing or dismissal. Again people depart in silence.

The liturgies of Holy Thursday and Good Friday give the sense of being unfinished. They leave us up in the air, waiting for something more. And there is more!

At the Easter Vigil we gather around a fire in silent darkness for the blessing of the fire and the lighting of the paschal candle. The liturgy concludes with the joyful paschal dismissal: 'Go in the peace of Christ, alleluia, alleluia' as we process out into the dark or Easter dawn, to the sounds of the triumphant Easter hymn.

The three-day liturgy, which began with the entrance and greeting on Holy Thursday evening, has moved us from suffering through death to resurrection. The whole Easter mystery is celebrated from a different point of view on each of the three days. The Triduum is not a reenactment of past events separated into neat historical or liturgical compartments. The death and resurrection we celebrate is our dying and rising in Christ today.

Over 200 people turned up for this Action Forum on to learn about solutions to the housing crisis in Geelong, including 9 parishioners from St. Bernard's Parish. Victorian MPs Ella George and Christine Couzens attended and pledged to assist our efforts.

7258 people were supported by specialist homelessness services in the Barwon region in the last year. There are 7,101 households on the priority list for social housing.

Holy Week

In Holy Week, which begins on Palm Sunday, 24 March, Catholics participate in ancient religious practices, some of which are detailed below.



Palms, processions and the passion

On Palm Sunday, the Catholic Church recalls

Jesus' messianic entrance into Jerusalem before his crucifixion. As Jesus rode into the city on a small donkey, the Jews gathered around him, throwing cloaks and palm branches on the road and exclaiming praises as he passed by. At Palm Sunday Mass, palm branches are blessed and the faithful process into church.

The Lord's Supper

On Holy Thursday, the Catholic Church celebrates a special Mass of the Lord's Supper - that commemorates the institution of the Holy Eucharist at the Last Supper. On the night before Jesus Christ was crucified, he changed the bread and wine into his own Body and Blood, and he commanded the apostles – and their successors- to act in his stead and re-present this sacrifice. So, at every Mass, by the way of transubstantiation, the bread and wine offered by the priest becomes Christ's Body and Blood again.

Washing feet

Just as Christ did for his 12 apostles at the Last Supper and as he commanded them to do likewise, during the Mass of the Lord's Supper, the priest, who represents Christ, ceremoniously washes the feet of 12 people in the congregation. At the Holy Thursday liturgy in the Vatican, even the Pope performs the foot washing.

Going with Jesus to Gethsemane

After the Last Supper and before he was arrested and condemned to death, Jesus went to pray in the Garden of Gethsemane, accompanied by two of the disciples. So, after the Holy Thursday Mass, the remaining sacred hosts are carried out of the sanctuary to an Altar of Repose, and the people go with the Eucharistic Christ in a procession. People stay for a time, adoring the wondrous sacrament that Jesus instituted that day more than 2,000 years ago.

A vacant church

The Mass of the Lord's Supper is finished, the church, now without the Eucharist, is truly empty. So, the tabernacle light- which is always lit and signifying Christ's presence – is extinguished, and the tabernacle door is left open, exposing the vacant interior. The altar is stripped bare of its linens and candles, holy water is removed from the church's fonts and the sacraments are not celebrated until the Easter Vigil. Like the first Christians bereft of Jesus and mourning the two days after the crucifixion, the church stands unadorned until the Easter Vigil Mass on Saturday night. With the resurrection of Jesus, the church's joy is restored.

Stations of the Cross

The Stations for the Cross devotion is centred on the Passion of Christ. This recalls the way of Jesus' suffering and death. By praying the Stations of the Cross, a person makes a spiritual pilgrimage to the principal scenes of the salvific Passion of the Lord.

Embrace the Cross

On Good Friday, the church gathers for the Liturgy of the Lord's Passion, which includes a reading of a Gospel account of the Passion, Holy Communion (consecrated at Mass on Thursday night) and veneration of the Cross.

University report, Not so sweet: chocolate, slavery and complicit corporations, found that, "More than two million children under the age of 15 years old work in the cocoa industry in Ivory Coast and Ghana. Many are the children of farm labourers, but others are also sold to farms as bonded labourers from neighbouring Burkina Faso and Mali"

Slavery-free chocolate is chocolate that is certified. Look for chocolate with one of the three logos Fairtrade, Rainforest Alliance, Cocoa Horizons.
