Reflection

Advent marks the beginning the new liturgical year; a season that allows us to prepare for the birth of Christ. As I reflected upon the season, the expression a 'New Year's resolution' came to mind; one that I was not familiar with until I arrived in Australia and entered the seminary. When we think of New Year's resolutions at the end of each year, we often reflect on what we can do better ourselves.

Interestingly, the origin of New Year's resolutions is not a modern invention. It can be traced to a religious foundation both in ancient Roman society and biblical times. The Romans of antiquity, who were superstitious and fearful of provoking the ire of their gods, resolved every January to begin a new year with better aspirations and goals. This got me thinking, why can't we make a 'liturgical New Year's resolution' to coincide with the beginning of Advent? Whilst the ancient Romans made their resolutions out of fear of their gods, we should make a New Year's resolution that pleases God – a *spiritual resolution*.

Keeping in mind that we ought not make resolutions that are too noble, which are unachievable, but rather, set out to resolve to contribute in some small way to the betterment of ourselves and the world. For example, we may resolve to 'mend' a relationship that has been fractured in some way, be it with others or with God, or we may resolve to act to safeguard the environment, to do 'our bit'. Making a spiritual New Year's resolution at the start of the Advent season will allow us to strengthen the bonds with those around us, as well as God, and will hopefully create a sense of peace in our hearts, knowing that our relationships have become more wholesome. May we bring the goodness of Jesus into our lives and the lives of others as we prepare for His birth. Fr Sang Ho

Timely Living and the End of History

Our Lord portrays himself as the Master who goes away on a journey. It is certain that he will return, even if no-one in his household knows exactly when. That is our situation. What do we do in anticipation?

Our Lord, the Master, indicates we have a choice. We can close our eyes and enter into the world of dreams where we create our own fantasy futures, or we can stay awake and alert to do what Our Lord wants us to do: '*He left his servants in charge, giving to each his work*.'

You and me – his servants – have a particular role or work in and for this phase of human history. A deep down intuition, prompted by the Holy Spirit, indicates what this is. We must be true to this assignment.

We could take a moment to pray that, when the Lord returns, we may hear: 'Come, good and faithful servant, inherit the Kingdom prepared for you since the foundation of the world.' Fr Michael Tate

The Character and Characters of Advent

The season of Advent, unlike other liturgical seasons, encompasses several different purposes and key figures.

The Roman Document on the Liturgical Year describes Advent as having 'a twofold character: as a season to prepare for Christmas when Christ's first coming to us is remembered and as a season when that remembrance directs the mind and heart to await Christ's second coming at the end of time. Advent is thus a period for devout and joyful expectation'. (GNLY 39)

First the season focuses our attention on the end of time when Christ will come again in glory. Then John the Baptist, who heralds Jesus' public ministry, takes centre stage. Finally, in preparation for the joyful celebration of Christmas, the liturgy of Advent focuses on the nativity. What joins these diverse elements together is the spirit of 'devout and joyful expectation'.

The gospel of the first Sunday of Advent looks to the Lord's coming in glory at the end of time. This year, the year of Mark, the message is urgent: Stay awake! Advent begins therefore by picking up themes that occur in the final Sundays of Ordinary Time at the end of the previous year's cycle, especially in the feast of Christ the King.

John the Baptist is the central actor in the gospels of the second and third Sundays of Advent. It can sometimes be a little confusing just before Christmas to be hearing stories telling of events some thirty years after Jesus' birth. It is a reminder that the Church's liturgy is not a chronological re-enactment of past events but a living encounter with the whole mystery of Jesus' incarnation, ministry, death and resurrection to glory.

The notion of Christ as the Messiah may also assist us to appreciate the fullness of the mystery that is celebrated in Advent. The first readings for these weeks are taken from the prophets who looked forward to the coming of the messiah. In this year B we hear from Isaiah. These texts help to situate John the Baptist as the last of the prophets who prepared for the coming of the Christ, the salvation of God's people.

The character of Advent changes sharply on the 17th December as the readings now look at the circumstances of Jesus' birth. On the fourth Sunday of Advent we hear the story of the Annunciation from the gospel of Luke and the focus is on the role of Mary in salvation history. Liturgy Lines - edited

The new priests are Fr Thomas Christie, Fr Peter Nguyen and Fr Tien Tran. Jean-Sébastien Géry was also ordained to the transitional diaconate, the penultimate step in the journey to becoming a priest.

During his homily, Archbishop Peter A Comensoli reminded the ordinands of what constitutes a vocation in Christ: '[St] Paul talks of charity, selflessness, gentleness, patience, unity and peace. We might firstly note just how closely these vocational elements harmonise with the gifts of the Holy Spirit." Edited extract Cathnews
