Reflection

The Lenten journey has begun with our traditional celebration of Ash Wednesday. This year, we had all the year six students from our school joining our parish Mass in the morning. They were invited to be the school representatives to join in on our community celebration and then took the responsibility to take Ashes back to school for the other year level groups to celebrate this significant occasion within the school.

At the evening Mass our two RCIA candidates signed their names on the scrolls with their sponsors. On the first Sunday of Lent they travelled to the Cathedral and submitted their scrolls and their names were inscribed into the book of the Elect.

Apart from commencing our Journey of Lent with Ash Wednesday celebrations, last Tuesday, 22 Children from our parish have commenced their first Eucharist classes. This program will run for eight weeks. These students will then join our Clairvaux students for the commitment Masses, a formation night with parents and a retreat day. They will then receive Communion for the first time in May. I ask you to keep all these young ones in your prayers.

As I reflect on the work of faith education, I recall something that I have learned about the bamboo tree. As you know the bamboo tree is one of the most significant symbols for the Vietnamese people. Just as the golden wattle is Australia's national floral emblem, the bamboo tree is Vietnam's national emblem.

They say that it takes **four years** for a bamboo shoot to grow only **3cm** tall. But from the **fifth year** onward, it could grow very quickly and in an unimaginable way, **30cm a day**! This means that within **6 weeks**, it could reach a height of **15 meters**. Possibly, there are times that we feel disheartened as we might not easily see much growth in the first few years, we might not see the result of successes or achievements. Very often, we tend to think that first few foundation years are a waste of time. However, the facts about the growth of the bamboo tree teach us that foundation years are so very important. This is because these are the years when hundreds of meters of bamboo root embed deep down into the soil and create a solid foundation for the tree to grow further.

So let us not lose hope in the work of sharing faith with our young ones. St Paul reminds us in his first letter to the Corinthians when he says that: 'I planted the seed, Apollos watered it, but God has been making it grow.' We can definitely plant the seed and water it, but God will know how to make the seed grow. Fr Sang Ho

Project Compassion—For Future Generations



Samoa may be a country surrounded by water, but access to clean drinking water is scarce in some areas, with many families facing extreme hardship as a result.

Leaia lives with her five children, husband, brother, and sister-in-law on the island of Upolu in Samoa. Not having access to clean water for their daily lives has caused Leaia a lot of worry. Their home is not connected to a piped water system, so they used to rely solely on rainwater collected in old fridges. When their water ran out, she had to walk with her young children to collect water in buckets and

containers from a neighbour down the street.

With the support of Caritas Australia's local partner, Caritas Samoa, a water tank was installed at their home. She and her family now have a steady supply of clean drinking water at home. Next year, they will also have a toilet built, with the support of Caritas Samoa, which will further improve.

'We are very thankful and grateful for the water tank. It has helped us so much and made our daily life easier,' Leaia said.

Lent banner:

A big "thank you" to Jan Fagan for preparing the Lent banner across the front of the altar at short notice.

Central to the banner is the image (painted by Titian in 1560) of Jesus carrying the cross to Calvary. The lantern in the left hand corner of the banner is a reminder of the light which we are all seeking, which we sometimes struggle to find.

Lent is a time when we are called to conversion, to trust in the future, in spite of temptations not to do so. It is the light and life that emerge after the Crucifixion because of Jesus' Resurrection that give us hope to persevere in walking our own way of the cross throughout our lives. The Liturgy Team

What Lent means to people preparing to join the Catholic Church

Like many traditions in the Catholic Church, the season of Lent developed over time from simple, practical origins.

In the early Church, new members were always initiated into the Christian community at Easter. People preparing for baptism, called '*catechumens*', fasted for two days beforehand. Gradually this time of preparation lengthened until, by the fourth century, it had become set at 40 days.

The number 40 has special significance in scripture: in the story of the great flood it rained for 40 days and 40 nights; Christ spent 40 days in the wilderness after being baptised by John; Moses and Elias fasted for 40 days in the desert.

As well as the time for catechumens to make their final preparations for initiation, Lent was a period of preparation for penitents who would be reconciled with the Christian community on Holy Thursday. Other members of the church journeyed with the catechumens and penitents during these 40 days through fasting, almsgiving and prayer.

When it became the norm for infants rather than adults to be baptised, Lent lost its baptismal focus and became associated almost exclusively with penance. This is why many people associate Lent exclusively with acts of self-denial, like 'giving up' a favourite food or pastime.

The original meaning and purpose of Lent has largely been reclaimed because of a change in the process of initiating adults into the Church following the Second Vatican Council. For hundreds of people who will be baptised at Easter, Lent is once again a time of intense preparation known as the '*Period of Purification and Enlightenment'*.

A special liturgy called the Rite of Election is held on the first Sunday of Lent, usually in the cathedral church of the diocese, to mark the beginning of this stage. It celebrates publicly the fact that the catechumens have progressed on their faith journey and have opened their hearts to Christ in a spirit of faith and love. They are '*elected'* for initiation into the Church, not because they have earned it, but because God has chosen them. From this point on they are known as 'the elect'. The Church asks us all to 'surround the elect with prayer' and to 'accompany them to encounter Christ'.

On the third, fourth and fifth Sundays of Lent, rites called '*Scrutinies'* are celebrated with the elect in their parish communities. In the light of God's word, they examine their lives and ask the entire Christian community to pray that whatever is weak and sinful within them may be eliminated and that whatever is good and holy may be affirmed.

As well as conferring strength and healing on the elect, these rites confront all the faithful with the need for conversion. Lent is a time of purification and enlightenment for each one of us as we strive to rid ourselves of the hidden corruption of evil.

During Lent we are all on a journey as we prepare to celebrate the life, death and resurrection of Christ at the Easter Triduum and to continue that celebration throughout the 50 days of the joyful Season of Easter. *Edited Extract Elizabeth Harrington – Liturgy Lines*
