To our Catholic Communities in Australia, Dear friends,

I'm sure October 7 is etched in our memories now as a day when once again the Middle East, and particularly the Holy Land, was devastated with a new wave of violence. The Franciscans have, for eight centuries, been responsible for the care of the many sacred places, as well as schools and parishes in Israel, Gaza and the West Bank.

Pope Francis has called for peace: "Terrorism and extremism do not help reach a solution to the conflict between Israelis and Palestinians, but fuel hatred, violence, revenge and only cause each other to suffer. The Middle East does not need war, but peace, a peace built on dialogue and the courage of fraternity... Please do not shed any more innocent blood, neither in the holy land, nor in Ukraine, nor anywhere else! Enough! Wars are always a defeat, always!

At this time, I ask you on behalf of all those affected by this conflict to pray for peace with Psalm 122, 6-9:

Ask for peace for Jerusalem: may those who love you live in safety; let there be peace in your walls, safety in your palaces. For my brothers and my friends, I will say: Upon you be peace! By the house of the Lord our God, I will ask good for you.

Laudate Deum

The Vatican released the new Apostolic Exhortation by Pope Francis, *Laudate Deum*, to all people of good will on the climate crisis, on 4 October 2023. It is a document intended to follow up on his 2015 encyclical, *Laudato Si'*, On Care for Our Common Home.

It is worth remembering that an apostolic exhortation is a teaching document from the pope, which aims to exhort (encourage) a particular virtue or activity.

Laudate Deum was released on the Feast of St Francis of Assisi, "Laudate Deum" holds a special place in Pope Francis' papacy, drawing inspiration from the saint known for his love of creation and care for the marginalised. This release date is meaningful as it aligns with St Francis' life and vision with the urgent need to address today's ecological and social challenges.

The title 'Laudate Deum' translates to 'Praise God,' a powerful reminder of the importance of stewardship and the responsible use of power. It emphasises the Pope's urgent call to tackle the climate crisis, recognising that time is running out and irreversible damage has been done.

While individual actions are crucial, Pope Francis underscores the necessity of political change on a global scale. He emphasises the importance of taking action now and the importance of upcoming events like COP28 in driving meaningful change.

Despite the seriousness of the challenges we face, Pope Francis encourages hope, reminding us that despair only exacerbates the impacts of climate change, especially on the most vulnerable among us. This message is particularly relevant in our world today, as we witness the effects of climate change and the urgent need for action. As Catholics, we are called to be stewards of our common home, echoing the message of 'Laudate Deum' in our actions and advocacy.

Contrasts Jesus' description of the Pharisees' behaviour offers a stark contrast to his own way of bringing about the Kingdom of God. By their actions, the Pharisees place burdens on the shoulders of others – burdens of guilt, shame, duty and punishment.

Throughout his ministry, Jesus acted to lift such burdens from the shoulders of the downtrodden and marginalised. Jesus accuses the Pharisees of being motivated by drawing attention to themselves – the way they dress, the way they like to be addressed, even where they sit in the synagogues. In contrast, Jesus' ministry was typified by his humility and focus on others.

There have been periods in the church's history where the burdens placed on the shoulders of people-particularly an exaggerated sense of guilt for certain sins—truly weighed people down, creating a terrible sense of unworthiness, leading to the living of distorted lives.

Our Lord makes it clear that leaders cannot evade resposibility for this by hiding behind honorific titles.

In the Gospels, we find the ONE who said: 'Come to me all you who toil and are burdened and I will *refresh you*. Take my yoke upon you *and you will find rest for your souls*. For my yoke is easy and my burden light.'(Matt 11:28-30)

If people don't find that the burden laid by Church leaders (who often long to be greeted obsequiously) leads to refreshment and rest for souls, then it is right to question the burden, and to question the leaders who impose such burdens.

Perhaps we could pause for a moment to pray for Pope Francis whose favoured titles are simply: 'Bishop of Rome', Servant of the Servants of God'.

Pope asks faithful to pray for him this month

In 'The Pope Video' for November, Pope Francis asks the faithful to 'Pray to the Lord that He will bless me', saying, 'Your prayer gives me strength and helps me to discern and to accompany the Church, listening to the Holy Spirit'.

Pope Francis reminds the faithful in this month's video that 'The fact that someone is Pope doesn't mean they lose their humanity. On the contrary, my humanity grows each day with God's holy and faithful people.'

He adds, 'Being Pope is also a process. The person becomes aware of what it means to be a pastor. And in this process, he learns how to be more charitable, more merciful, and, above all, more patient, like God our Father, who is so patient.'

Knowing that popes are often 'judged harshly' and will have to render 'a serious account' of their ministry to God, Pope Francis asks his listeners 'to judge benevolently' and 'pray that the Pope, whoever he might be – today it is my turn – may receive the help of the Holy Spirit, that he may be docile to that help.'

Specifically, he asks for prayers for the Pope 'so that in the exercise of his mission, he may continue to accompany in the faith the flock entrusted to him by Jesus, always with the help of the Holy Spirit'.

Christian Leadership

The Christian model of leadership often flies in the face of societal concepts of leadership. Many of the models of leadership we witness in society focus on exerting power over others. People are praised for showing 'strong' leadership when they manipulate situations, bully less powerful people and bulldoze their way through others' opinions. Whilst this model of leadership may have a certain effectiveness in the short term, there is certainly nothing 'Christian' about its operation and ultimately it forces a wedge between the leader and the led. Christian leadership focuses on empowering all parties and rather than power over others, it embraces power through and with others.

National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Catholic Council (NATSICC) calls for new way forward after Voice outcome.

An unsuccessful outcome to the Voice to Parliament referendum is just another challenge that will be faced with dignity, respect and without losing hope, a statement from the National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Catholic Council says.



Throughout this journey we, the members of NATSICC, have placed an emphasis on fostering respectful dialogue and providing Catholics with information to help them make their decision. We are proud to have maintained the stance that all people are created equal in the image of God and thus deserve to be respectfully treated, regardless of their stance on the referendum question.

Guided by the Catholic social teaching principle of subsidiarity, we (along with most First Australians) saw the value in a mechanism for our voice, and the voices of our children and grandchildren to be heard in Parliament and the potential for tangible outcomes to improve the day to day lives of our people. We also acknowledged that this was not the only way forward, but a step on the journey of Reconciliation.

We accept that, for a variety of reasons, the Australian people have decided that an enshrined Voice is not the way to recognise Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders in the Constitution, or see it as useful to help Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples gain an equal footing on metrics such as life expectancy, health and socio economics.

What we must not accept is that this signals the end of the journey.

Statistics from the Closing the Gap strategy show that we cannot maintain the status quo. We now call on those that espoused alternatives to champion Indigenous-led ideas and initiatives that will address these practical issues, and for all people in this country to work for reconciliation.
