The journey of the Magi, Pope Francis suggests, should prompt us to ask ourselves: 'How is the journey of my faith going?'

As the Pope says, the Magi were infused with a spiritual restlessness born of their desire for something transcendent. It is a dynamic which is useful for reflecting on our own situation in this

present age. Are we stuck in what the Pope characterises as a spiritual parking lot? 'Do our words and our liturgies ignite in people's hearts a desire to move towards God' he asks, or does our worship look and sound like something that 'speaks only of itself and to itself?

The Magi offer us, the Pope says, four useful ways of thinking about where we are and where we should go. Firstly, they 'set out,' making sure our faith is forward-looking and active. Secondly, they had the courage to 'defy Herod,' providing a model of courage that stands up to powers that would oppress and harm the poorest. Thirdly, they took 'another way,' forging new paths, trusting in God's creative power. And fourthly, they 'worshipped the Child', making sure that our focus was on the God towards whom we journey in hope. Nick Brodie, Liturgy Help

Pope Francis' Message for World Day of Peace-1st January



`Artificial intelligence ought to serve our best human potential and our highest aspirations, not compete with them, ' the Pope said in his message for the January 1 commemoration.

The message, 'Artificial Intelligence and Peace', was addressed to all men and women in the world, and in

particular to heads of state and government and the leaders of the different religions and civil society.

The Pope's message highlighted the 'need to strengthen or, if necessary, to establish bodies charged with examining the ethical issues arising in this field and protecting the rights of those who employ forms of artificial intelligence or are affected by them'.

The impact of any form of artificial intelligence 'depends not only on its technical design, but also on the aims and interests of its owners and developers, and on the situations in which it will be employed', he said.

Positive outcomes 'will only be achieved if we show ourselves capable of acting responsibly and respect such fundamental human values as 'inclusion, transparency, security, equity, privacy and reliability',' the Pope added.

The huge advances in new information technologies, he said, 'offer exciting opportunities and grave risks, with serious implications for the pursuit of justice and harmony among peoples'.

Pope Francis said, 'We need to be aware of the rapid transformations now taking place and to manage them in ways that safeguard fundamental human rights and respect the institutions and laws that promote integral human development." Edited extract Cathnews

The feast of the Epiphany celebrates the revelation of Jesus to humankind. The wise men are the representatives of humanity bearing witness to this revelation. However, the Epiphany celebrates the revelation of Jesus as not only the Messiah of Israel but the Saviour of the whole *world*. Interestingly, in this gospel that emphasises the 'Jewish-ness' of Jesus, the witnesses to the birth are gentiles from a foreign land. Their inclusion is a powerful declaration that the revelation of Jesus is for all people.
